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I. **GENERAL COMMENTS**:

The Chula Vista Police Department continues being a well-maintained facility. The department reported three secured detentions in 2022 due to staff's "automatic" routine with adult inmates and moments after staff realizing their mistake, juveniles were unsecured. The facility reported now having an orientation process where minors are informed of all rights and process of their detainment. Upon recommendations from last inspection, the facility revised their detention logs to provide a better visual organization of information collected, and this allowed Commissioners to better understand the logs. The department does not have clothing or blankets available on-site, these are "never been requested." In contrast to what the department informed Commissioner's during the last inspection, guidelines are not being followed when a minor is arrested under the influence. There was one minor detained while under the influence of alcohol and released to parents without obtaining medical clearance. The report of this incident was reviewed by Commissioners, and it stated that minor was throwing up at time of arrest. The Commission was provided with the Chula Vista Police Department Policy Manual which includes the policy on intoxicated minors.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

The Juvenile Justice Commission recommends the following:

- 1. Keep clothes and blankets on-site for detained youth.
- 2. The Chula Vista Police Department Policy manual states, "Juveniles who exhibit any of the following conditions should not be held at the CVPD: (d) Significantly intoxicated except when approved by the Watch Commander. A medical clearance shall be obtained for minors who are under the influence of drugs, alcohol, or any other intoxicating substance to the extent that they are unable to care for themselves (15 CCR 1151)." However, this policy was not followed during one detention in 2022. The Commission recommends reviewing the policy Manual with all staff and revising the specifics of "significantly intoxicated" as well as the Watch Commander's policies regarding this condition.
