Problematic record-keeping at this facility. Had Title 15 training this year. Facility to correct information it misreported to the State.

February - One youth reported as secure that was non secure.

July - Reported 5 non-secure juvenile custodies but only 4 noted in the records;

December - No sheets in file. Sheets found in adult files. Reported 12 non-secure juvenile custodies, actually 13 such custodies.

RECOMMENDATIONS (if any):

The Juvenile Justice Commission recommends that El Cajon PD continue with training efforts. The Juvenile Justice Commission encourages facility to contact the Commission for a tutorial on record-keeping and reporting requirements.

The Juvenile Justice Commission suggests having the Secure and Nonsecure forms both in folders.
